Visit an exhibition

Exhibitions during the week include Unfinished, a series of photographs by clients, builders and students working on projects with architect Niall McLaughlin,

at the Photofusion gallery in Brixton, plus the six architect-designed birdwatching hides in Battersea Park by designers who include Giani Botsford, Nick Stickland and Spacelab.

For Frank Gehry fans, there is the gala screening of the new Sydney Pollack film, Sketches of Frank Gehry, tomorrow in Chelsea (www.curzon cinemas.com), which will be followed on Friday with Pollack and Gehry in conversation at the RIBA.

One of the more surreal offerings of the week will be a 15-minute film called **The Games**, made with artist Hilary Powell, in which a version of the Olympics is staged on derelict wasteland in Stratford poised to become the 2012 Olympic Park.

Book offer: New London Architecture

As a sequel to the excellent New London Architecture book of 2001, comes New London Architecture 2.

Lavishly illustrated, and with knowledgeable and succinct text by Kenneth Powell and Cathy Strongman, it is a great way to catch up with the amazing crop of recent new projects in and around the city.

Homes include a striking one-off house by Prewett Bizley in Newington Green on the site of an old shed; One Centaur Street, a block of flats that makes the most of a tricky inner London site, by De Rijke Marsh Morgan; and the Wrap House extension in Chiswick, by Alison Brooks, which sets new imaginative standards for adding space.

Many other high-profile projects featured include the uplifting Evelina Children's Hospital at St Thomas', by Hopkins Architects; Terry Farrell's complex Home Office in Victoria; and Will Alsop's intriguing Palestra office building in Blackfriars Road, Southwark.
